
Akta Lakota Museum & Cultural Center ...

The cultural center opened in 1991 on the campus of St. Joseph's Indian School. The words *Akta Lakota*, meaning *to honor the people*, were chosen because the museum is truly intended to honor and preserve the rich Lakota culture for the students at St. Joseph's Indian School and for thousands who visit the museum each year.

Art, artifacts and educational displays in the museum's collection honor the proud Lakota (Sioux) heritage and culture. Much of the museum's original collection came from gifts to St. Joseph's by alumni and friends since the school's inception in 1927.

Since the museum opened, it has acquired many new pieces and continually strives to add appropriate pieces to the collection.

The museum's gift shop, gives local artists a venue to display and sell their work.



More than just a museum ...

St. Joseph's Akta Lakota Museum & Cultural Center is the only Native American center of its kind. The facility is more than a traditional museum because it provides visitors with a living lesson on the Native American way of life — both past and present.



A museum tour reflects the four cardinal colors and directions for the Lakota.

— Camp Circle depicts life on the Great Plains prior to Euro-American contact; exhibits explain historical relationships of tribes and bands and features items of traditional culture.

South — *Two Worlds Meet* details the arrival of Euro-American explorers, missionaries, traders and settlers in the early 1800s.

West — *Broken Promises* outlines US Government involvement with the Sioux; details the loss of traditional lands and treaties and maps out current reservation lands.

North — Continuity and Change illustrates how Native Americans adapted to their new way of life and successfully preserved their traditions and heritage.

- ◆ Lakota Buffalo Days is a 36-foot diorama by renowned artist Tom Phillips giving a sweeping view of life on the prairie from the Missouri River to the Black Hills.
- Audio/Visual Observation Area transports viewers into daily Lakota experiences.
- Gift Shop features a striking collection of unique sterling, bead and quill jewelry as well as quilts, original sculptures, paintings, traditional crafts and more.

- Interactive Displays provide visitors of all ages with the opportunity to learn and take part in the culture through informal, hands-on exhibits.
