



1 **Doc Culleton Interpretive Center** is the heart of GEM's historic campus. Start your tour here, visit our gift shop, and enjoy the museum!



2 **Saratoga Cabin** was built prior to 1890. It was home to a saloon keeper, a freighter and his bride, and then Judge Kuykendal, who sat on an infamous murder trial.



3 **Blacksmith** was an important feature to early mining towns. The smith was a talented craftsman who repaired or forged new horseshoes, wagon wheels, or any other metal object.



4 **Higby Barn** was used to house a light driving team circa 1908. It was once owned by the Encampment City Marshal.



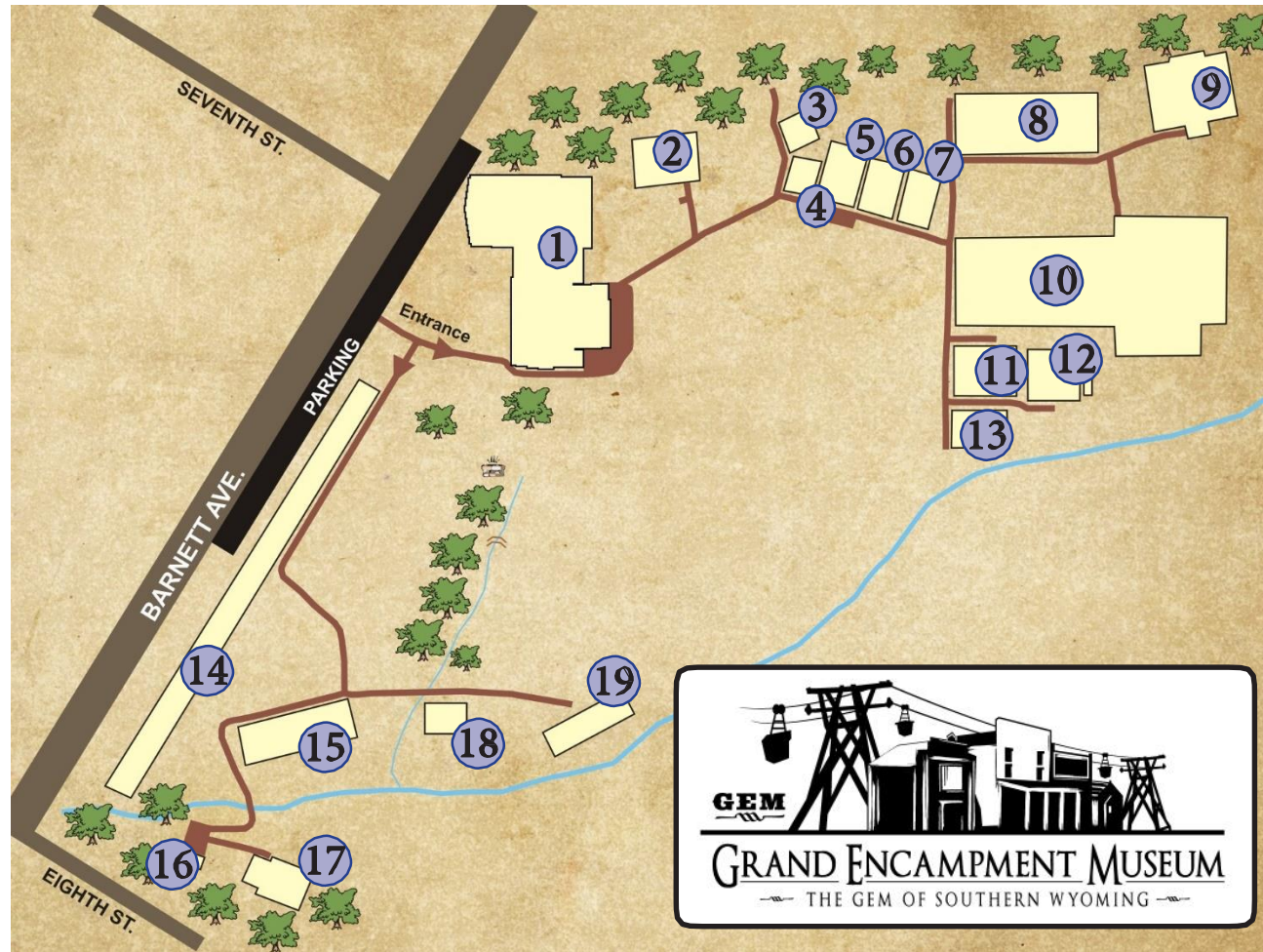
5 **Palace Bakery & Ice Cream Shop** was in operation circa 1900 on McCaffrey Ave. If you have an ailment, the dentist office upstairs will fix you up good as new. Then you can run back downstairs for ice cream!



6 **Kuntzman** was a saloon and when copper prices fell, mugs of ale were raised and Encampment endured the bust. Take a look around this western icon; just don't trip on a spittoon.



7 **Battle Miner** was the last building standing in the old copper mining town of Battle, now a ghost town. Settled into its new home at GEM, it houses the GEM print shop.



8 **Vocational-Agricultural Building** was constructed as a shop project by Encampment High School boys in 1935. Today, it houses various exhibits including George's Hat Shop and Casto's Rock Shop.



9 **Parkison House** was home to a wealthy family in Encampment who were the first in town to have electricity and running water. See how Encampment's upper-class citizens lived!

Livery-Peryam Transportation Barn is where wheels are always turning and something new is always on display. Different vehicles for different purposes through time are on display.



Lake Creek Stage Station was a stop-over on the stagecoach route from Encampment to Walcott Junction. Experience the place where dusty travelers crossed the threshold from rambling road to a comfy road stop to spend the night or grab a bite to eat.



Slash Ridge Fire Tower beckons from above. This tower is the former home to numerous brave forest custodians who quickly located and reported fires, saving lives and property.



Webber Springs Forest Service Cabin is a cozy cabin built for USFS employees. Guess how they entered the cabin when the front door was blocked by snow!



Aerial Mining Tramway was built in 1902 and was 16 miles long. This gravity-propelled tramway brought prosperity by the bucket-full of copper ore across the Continental Divide to the copper smelter located in Encampment.



Peryam Cabin was built by one of the first families to settle in the area. It resonates with stories of adaptability and journeys.



Two-Story Outhouse is neither joke nor political statement, but a true necessity in the snowy climes when the upper story is necessary for more than just viewing the scenery.



Tie-Hack Cabin was inhabited by both men and women who worked as "tie-hacks". They would hand-hew railroad ties from trees; each did their part by collectively making millions of ties to connect a nation via the rail road.



Wolford Schoolhouse was the one-roomer, first school in Encampment.



S&E Caboose is ready for restoration. Watch the progress as she is brought back to life, just as she brought life and progress to Encampment so long ago.



The Grand Encampment Museum

is located in beautiful Southern Wyoming, nestled between the Snowy Range and the Sierra Madre Mountain Range.

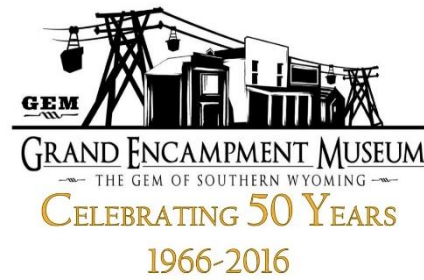
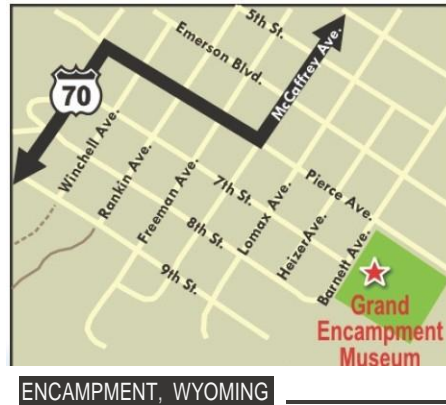
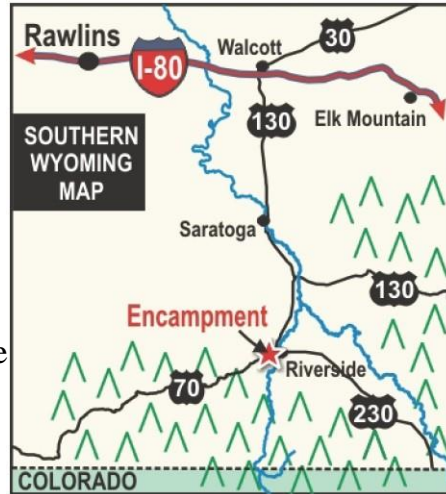
Visit our **GEM Gift Shop!** We sell books on local and regional western history, T-shirts, and unique gifts made by local Wyoming artists.
