THE BOMBARDMENT OF HARTLEPOOL

On December 16th 1914, at 8:10am, 3 ships of the German Navy bombarded the coastal towns of Hartlepool and West Hartlepool in a near 50 minute reign of terror.

Over 1,100 shells rained down over the shipbuilding town from three heavy cruisers, SMS Blucher, SMS Seydlitz and SMS Moltke.

Men, women and children who were heading to work or school fled Hartlepool in search of safety.

Over 130 people were killed and hundreds more were injured during the bombardment. Extensive damage was also caused to dozens of buildings, many of which are still scarred by pieces of shrapnel in the walls.

Pte Theophilus Jones, stationed at the Heugh Battery, was the first soldier to be killed by enemy action on British soil during World War I.

THE HEUGH BATTERY MUSEUM

The site of the Heugh Gun Battery has been a military position since the 17th century. Now the Heugh Battery Museum stands on the site of the only World War I battlefield in Britain and retells the story of the bombardment of the Hartlepools in 1914 when the guns of the Heugh Battery engaged in ship-to-shore combat.

The Heugh and the Lighthouse batteries bravely defended the towns and saved many lives during the North East bombardment.

The Heugh Battery Museum is spread across three levels:

- Underground magazines
- Parade ground and main museum
- Battery Command Post Providing panoramic views of the coast







THE HEUGH BATTERY MUSEUM COLLECTIONS

The museum boasts a unique collection of large artillery pieces and military artefacts dating from WWI to more recent conflicts.

At the museum volunteers are on hand to help you find out more about the artefacts and weapons we have on display, as well as the history of the site itself.

Our collection includes:

- Rifles
- Naval, field and anti-aircraft guns
- Gas masks
- Artwork
- Reconstructed trench exhibit
- Military vehicles
- Trench art
- Uniforms


