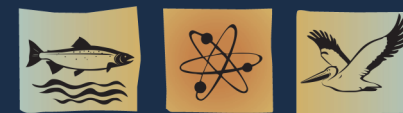

The REACH strives to bring its stories to life with interactive nature exhibits. The grounds are landscaped with native plants closely reflecting the ever changing shrub steppe natural ecology of the Mid-Columbia region. The stories told explore the history, heritage, science, energy, technology, agriculture, and environmental stewardship of the Columbia River, the Hanford Reach National Monument, the Columbia Basin Irrigation Project, the Manhattan Project National Historic Park, and the Ice Age Floods Trail.

The Manhattan Project

...history, heritage and culture of an era

Personal accounts and artifacts highlight how the top-secret Manhattan Project transformed the Mid-Columbia region during World War II as engineers at the Hanford Site raced to produce material for the nuclear weapons that ended the war. The newest addition, which focuses on the Cold War, expands on the production that continued at the Hanford site and its impact on the community.
