

DEPOT HISTORY

The Depot, completed in 1903 by the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy (CB&Q) Railroad, replaced an earlier wooden structure. In the 1990s, a group of citizens formed Save Our Depot, Inc. (SOD) to avert demolition of the Depot by the Burlington Northern. SOD restored and preserved the Depot by securing numerous grants and in-kind donations. The restored Depot was rededicated as a museum in December 2003 to celebrate its 100th anniversary.

The Depot building is architecturally significant due to its Richardson Romanesque Revival Style, which influenced the first Chicago School of Architecture and prominent architects such as Louis Sullivan and Frank Lloyd Wright. Key design elements preserved in the Depot include recessed window arches, polychromatic use of two colors of stone, hip roof, arches that sit on the columns and stone stringer courses. For this reason, the Depot is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

RED OAK'S RAILROAD HISTORY

After Iowa became a state in 1846, railway investors competed to identify the most advantageous routes across the state. A survey in 1854 laid out a rail line from Burlington, IA, to Plattsmouth, NE, including a stop in Red Oak. By 1869, trains were rolling, and Montgomery County boomed with new businesses and settlers. The original rail center in Red Oak was just south of Market Street. Due to steep grades and

seasonal floods, the railway moved the main line four blocks south to a 35-foot bermed "high line" and added double tracks. Even with several ownership changes - CB&Q to Burlington Northern (BN) to Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) - Red Oak's line carries hundreds of rail cars daily, including Amtrak.

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MONTGOMERY COUNTY ROLE IN WORLD WAR II



Men and women from Montgomery County have served their nation well since 1860. The County always responds when called and has paid a heavy toll in the wars. Over 1,100 people from Montgomery County enlisted for active duty during World War II in all branches of service. Numerous civilians served on the home front. The soldiers, in the 168th Infantry Regiment.

34th "Red Bull" Infantry Division, embarked and disembarked at the Depots in Red Oak (Company M) and Villisca (Company F).

In a 1946 Saturday Evening Post article, writer Milton Lehman stated, "Fifty men of Red Oak died in World War II, making it one the highest mortalities any town in America has suffered." Life magazine also reported on the great loss Red Oak suffered in North Africa. The Depot Museum exhibits are dedicated to honoring all who served by telling their stories and preserving artifacts related to their sacrifices.

THE KASSERINE PASS BATTLE

Companies F and M were ordered into federal service February 1941 and participated in campaigns in the European-African-Mediterranean Theater, including Algeria, French Morocco, Tunisia, Naples-Foggia, Rome-Arno, North Apennines and the Po Valley.

The Kasserine Pass Battle put Companies F and M in the eye of the conflict with General Rommel's Nazi troops. Company F found themselves surrounded behind enemy lines; under the command of Major Robert Moore, about half managed to get through to American lines. During the battle, in one day Red Oak received 27 telegrams informing families of loved ones either "killed in action" or "missing in action" with many becoming German prisoners of war.

Directions: From U.S. Hwy 34 and State Hwy 48 intersection: Go south on Hwy 48 1.5 miles to Short Street. Turn left/east on Short Street. *Go two blocks to Second Street. Turn right/south on Second Street; go one long block to the Museum driveway on your right.
