The outside world feels a long way away.









The spa provides an even more peaceful oasis in this already tranquil resort.



Bowood House

Home to the 9th Marquis & Marchioness of Lansdowne, Bowood House is a veritable treasure trove of artistic, architectural and historical curiosities.

The Library below was first designed by Robert Adam in 1769, but was then altered by Charles Cockerell in the 1820's. It contains at least 5,000 books mostly leather bound and includes many rare editions. The 16 Etruscan vases were made for the 3rd Marquis by Josiah Wedgwood. Joseph Priestley discovered Oxygen gas in the laboratory next door, in 1774, whilst employed as a tutor to the sons of the first Lord Lansdowne.

Among the many other splendid pieces on display is the Albanian costume worn by the poet Lord Byron in the painting by Thomas Phillips, an amazing collection of Victoriana including the chair and footstool used by Queen Victoria at her wedding in 1840, a spectacular array of Indian artefacts brought back from India and Burma by the 5th Marquis who was viceroy from 1888 -1894 and even a Napoleonic collection which came to the family through the wife of the 4th Marquis whose father, Charles, Comte de Flahault, was Napoleon's aide-de-camp.
